Most importantly, this event raised over \$10,000 for our food pantry!



Recovery Month!

This time of year is a very busy time for us here at Jeremiah's Inn. Not only is September National Hunger Awareness Month (which is why we chose September for our CHOPPED!Worcester event, to support our Nutrition Center) but it is also National Recovery Month. Two causes very important to our hearts!

August 31st was International Overdose Awareness Day. Jeremiah's staff and residents headed down to City Hall Plaza in Worcester to help set up for a candlelight vigil in memorial to the lives lost to substance use disorders.

September 20th, The MA Department of Public Health Bureau of Substance Abuse Services presented "Artists in Recovery" at Faneuil Hall in Boston. This was a recovery awareness event that offered live music, storytelling, comedy and more! Jeremiah's own Kenny Pina was a featured artist at this event, with his incredible, recovery based poetry!

September 23rd was the 9th Annual Worcester Cares About Recovery Walk. Jeremiah's Inn staff and residents hosted an information table at this event, as well as participated in the walk to raise awareness around recovery month and to support the recovery community.

September 23rd was also the date for the Annual "Bang 'em for the Banger" Memorial Disc Gold tournament. Hosted by the family of Michael 'Banger' Valerio, who was an avid disc golf player and lost his life to addiction. Proceeds from this fundraising event directly benefit Jeremiah's Inn. Holiday Wish Program

The holidays can be particularly difficult for our residents as they struggle with feelings of loneliness, hopelessness and despair. Many of the men have few ties left with family and friends. As a result, they end up spending the holiday here at the Inn. Many of them feel they have let everyone down -- their family, friends, co-workers, their community. It's a heavy burden to bear at what is supposed to be a happy time of year. Beyond this, our residents who are fathers often feel ashamed because they do not have the financial means to provide their children with a Christmas gift.

This time of year is also hard for Nutrition Center clients, as well, who struggle to make ends meet and put food on the table for their families. The area served by our food pantry contains two of Worcester's five Food Deserts (an area where people cannot access fresh, healthy food on a regular basis). In 2016, we provided food to more than 10,500 people, from diverse backgrounds who speak many different languages. Like many of the men we serve, our Nutrition Center clients cannot afford to provide their children with Christmas gifts.

Our Residential Substance Abuse Recovery Program serves 29 men at a time, and more than 100 men each year. Our Nutrition Center provides food, nutrition education and health-related programming to more than 10,000 residents each year.

I think we can all agree that <u>everyone</u> deserves a little joy, especially during the holiday season!

As Thanksgiving, Giving Tuesday, Christmas and Hanukkah approach, we know that many of you are looking to make a difference in your community. Those of us who are lucky enough to have happy holidays often want to share our good fortune, looking for ways to donate our time, talent and treasure so others can have a happy holiday season.

Jeremiah's Inn could use your help!

Resident Story: Meet Justin

Justin grew up right down the street, in Auburn, MA. The oldest of three, raised in a two-parent household, Justin had the loving support of his family, was involved in sports, and had a typical, 'normal', childhood.

Around age 12, he began experimenting, as so many other teens do, with alcohol and marijuana. Justin

Contact Melissa for specific sizes: Melissa@jeremiahsinn.com says he used both alcohol and marijuana on the weekends, but was still able to lead a productive life. That is, until he was exposed to Opioids.

Justin was 19 when he fell ill. He had severe back pain and digestive issues. He was prescribed OxyContin to mange his pain. Labelled as a miracle drug, and reported to have little to no adverse side effects to its users, doctors felt comfortable with prescribing this powerful narcotic for pain. Justin nor his family was aware of the dangers and potential for abuse with this medication. His use of the drug quickly turned to dependence, and not long after his doctors stopped prescribing it, Justin quickly turned to street drugs to provide the same effects as the OxyContin. Heroin is much easier to find, costs far less than buying Oxy-Contin, and easily justified given his circumstances and perceived pain. The veritable monkey that is addiction had already settled comfortably on Justin's back, and his life would never be the same.

At the time he fell ill, he had a one year old daughter, whom he adores. Unfortunately, since becoming an addict, Justin had little to no contact with his daughter, and has spent about four years total in jails. He made several attempts at treatment, and tried various programs, before finding Jeremiah's Inn in 2015. Justin came to us broken and tired, and throughout his time here, he has worked to get his life back on track. He even accomplished a long-term goal of getting his high school equivalency. Unfortunately, Justin wasn't building the crucial recovery network he needed, and when the temptation to use arose, he acted on it. He left Jeremiah's Inn, and for a long time attempted to stay clean on sheer willpower alone. Eventually, he got back to using as hard as ever.

In September 2017, Justin found himself homeless, on the streets of Boston, sleeping in the backs of trucks. He felt hopeless and helpless, and didn't want to die but didn't know how to continue living. He decided he would give recovery another try. When he arrived at detox, he was informed that his family was searching for him, and believed him to be dead, based on a misreport on social media. This was the motivation Justin needed, knowing that his disease and behaviors were not only affecting him, but also devastating his family and the people that loved him. He had to give recovery, real recovery, a shot this time. He decided to return to Jeremiah's Inn, and give this opportunity his all.

Justin says that Jeremiah's has provided him with so much more than just a roof over his head. Jeremiah's has given Justin a solid foundation upon which he can gain the tools he needs to work on himself and better manage his disease. He sees it as a place where he can work on spiritual principles, and become the productive member of society he knows he can be. Justin has been able to accomplish goals while here, including rebuilding a relationship with his daughter the family counseling provided on-site. He also hopes to return to school, find a stable job, and get his driver's license back. He knows with the support of Jeremiah's Inn, these are all achievable goals.

Justin says he is happy today, and is no longer fearful of the future, but instead he is excited to see what the future holds for him!
